W. Taylor Reveley IV President, Longwood University

W. Taylor Reveley IV began his term as Longwood University's 26th president in 2013, with deep ties to the University. Over the past century, members of his family have been leaders on the faculty and Board of Visitors as well as devoted students and alumni. As president, Reveley's principal areas of focus have included championing the value of the liberal arts and sciences, including Longwood's distinctive new core curriculum – Civitae – focused on citizen leadership; fostering the University's partnership begun in 2015 with the Moton Museum, the national historic landmark that neighbors Longwood's campus and honors Barbara Johns and the student Civil Rights movement in Prince Edward County; maintaining college affordability; enhancing the University's culture of philanthropy; and building joint momentum with Farmville, the nation's first two-college town.

A Richmond native, Reveley graduated with honors from Princeton University, where he majored in classics and was a member of the football team. He received a master's degree from Union Presbyterian Seminary and a J.D. from the University of Virginia. He began his career as an attorney with the law firm of Hunton & Williams, before serving as managing director of the University of Virginia's Miller Center, a nonpartisan institute focused on the U.S. presidency, policy and political history. President Reveley's wife, Marlo, is a technology entrepreneur, and they have two children, May and Quint.

The Honorable Governor Ralph Northam

Before he was inaugurated as the 73rd Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, Ralph Northam served as an Army doctor, pediatric neurologist, business owner, state Senator and Lieutenant Governor.

A native of Virginia's Eastern Shore, Governor Northam was educated at the Virginia Military Institute (VMI), where he graduated with distinction.

After graduation, Governor Northam was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Army. He served eight years of active duty and rose to the rank of major.

He attended Eastern Virginia Medical School and then traveled to San Antonio for a pediatric residency, where he met his wife Pamela, a pediatric occupational therapist at the same hospital. Governor Northam did his residencies at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center and served as chief neurological resident at Johns Hopkins Hospital. As an Army doctor, he served in Germany, treating soldiers wounded in Operation Desert Storm.

When Governor Northam and Pamela returned home, they chose to build their life in Hampton Roads. He began practicing pediatric neurology at Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters in Norfolk. He established Children's Specialty Group, his current medical practice, to provide expert pediatric care for patients. Governor Northam also served as assistant professor of neurology at Eastern Virginia Medical School, where he taught medicine and ethics.

Governor Northam volunteered as medical director for the Edmarc Hospice for Children in Portsmouth, where he spent 18 years caring for terminally ill children.

Governor Northam approaches public service with the same passion he brought to his military and medical service. He is committed to working with leaders from both parties to build a Virginia that works better for every family, no matter who they are or where they live.

Governor Northam is the first native of the Eastern Shore to serve as Governor since Governor Henry A. Wise took office 1856. He is also the first VMI Keydet to serve as Governor since Governor Westmoreland Davis took office in 1918.

Governor Northam and First Lady Pamela Northam have two adult children.

Cassidy Rasnick

Virginia Deputy Secretary of Commerce and Trade

Cassidy Rasnick serves as Deputy Secretary of Commerce and Trade for Rural Economic Development. Prior to her appointment, Rasnick managed the state's economic development efforts for two of the Commonwealth's largest industries – agriculture and forestry – while serving as manager of the office of business development at the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, and previously, as Deputy Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry for Governor McAuliffe. Before joining the McAuliffe administration, she worked for the Virginia Manufacturers Association and the Virginia Craft Brewers Guild. Rasnick also spent more than five years working for United State Senator Mark Warner.

A native of Botetourt County, Rasnick is a graduate of James Madison University and the Sorensen Institute for Political Leadership.

Governor Northam's Chief Broadband Advisor

Evan Feinman is both the Executive Director of the Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission and Governor Northam's Chief Broadband Advisor. He was previously Deputy Secretary of Natural Resources, Deputy Policy Director for the Governor McAuliffe's transition team, and the McAuliffe campaign's policy director. Evan has worked on multiple campaigns at the state and federal level, and at the Commonwealth Institute, a budget and fiscal policy think tank in Richmond.

He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Virginia, spent two years on a fellowship focused on energy and transportation policy, and then received his law degree from Washington and Lee University School of Law. A Lynchburg native, Evan currently resides in Richmond with his wife, Annalisa Feinman, an attorney with the Richmond Public Defender's office.

The Honorable David Whitus Mayor of Farmville

David Whitus was first appointed to Farmville Town Council in July 1998; his first term as mayor began in July 2014. Whitus graduated from Longwood College in 1983 with a B.S. degree in Business Administration with concentrations in Management and Finance.

Chief among the mayor's duties is serving as CEO of the town. Mayor Whitus is a member of the Farmville Chamber of Commerce and an honorary member of the Farmville Lions Club and the Farmville Rotary Club.

The Honorable Mark Peake Senate of Virginia District 22

The Honorable Bettina Ring Virginia's Secretary of Agriculture & Forestry

Governor Ralph S. Northam appointed Bettina Ring in 2018 to serve as the fourth Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry for the Commonwealth of Virginia. In this capacity, she supports the Governor's mission of building a strong Virginia economy in agriculture and forestry, two of Virginia's largest private industries, while also protecting the environment.

Prior to her appointment as Secretary, Ring was appointed by former Governor Terry McAuliffe to serve as the seventh State Forester of the Virginia Department of Forestry (VDOF). During her term leading the agency, Ring secured \$27 million in funding for emergency response equipment used to fight forest fires and to assist localities and other state agencies. A Virginia native, Ring began her career with VDOF and held a number of leadership positions, including deputy state forester, during her 18 years with the agency.

Prior to VDOF, Bettina was the senior vice president of family forests at the American Forest Foundation, a position responsible for overseeing the American Tree Farm System – the largest and oldest sustainable woodland program in America. She served on the federal Forest Resource Coordinating Committee, which provides direction within the U.S. Department of Agriculture and with the private sector to effectively address national priorities for private forest management. She holds a B.S. Degree in Forestry and Wildlife from Virginia Tech and a Masters of Business Administration from James Madison University.

Tamarah Holmes, Ph.D, is the director for the Office of Broadband at the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). She has spent 20 years in the public sector in the field of community and economic development in New York, New Jersey, Chesterfield, Virginia and now working state-wide in Virginia. Dr. Holmes has played an instrumental role in the creation of the Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) having served as the lead in the development of the program that has grown from a \$1 million to a \$750 million appropriation since 2017. In addition to serving as director, she serves as the Virginia Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) program manager, overseeing ARC's economic and community development programming in 25 counties and 8 independent cities in the Appalachian region of Virginia.

Rich Schollmann

Executive Director, VA Telecommunication Industry Association

Rich Schollmann has been the Executive Director of the Virginia Telecommunication Industry Association for the past year. The VTIA represents most of the small and mid-sized traditional telecom providers in Virginia. Rich previously served 20 years as a government affairs director for a number of telecom, cable and electric power companies.

Before government affairs, he worked as an attorney, first with the US Department of Justice and later as a regulatory attorney for a major telecom company. Rich is also a retired Marine Corps officer, where he served as a combat arms officer and then as a military attorney.

Aaron Schroeder PhD Research Associate Professor, Social & Decision Analytics Division, UVA

Dr. Schroeder's overarching research focus is the enablement of Evidence-Based Policy-Making and Program Evaluation through the Secure Liberation, Integration and Analysis of Administrative Data. Dr. Schroeder has extensive experience in the technologies and related policies of information/data integration and systems analysis, policy and program development and implementation, quantitative and qualitative methodologies of evaluation, and the general application of data and web technologies to the enhancement of public and private sector services.

A particular focus of Dr. Schroeder's research has been on the integration and analysis of education, health, social service and non-profit administrative data streams for the purpose of conducting policy analyses and program evaluations impacting a wide range of constituents, including: pre-K child social and health service recipients; child care service operators; primary, secondary, post-secondary and adult education service recipients; state workforce training service recipients; and, U.S. veteran health and social service recipients.

Sallie Ann Keller PhD, Division Director, Biocomplexity Institute, UVA

Dr. Sallie Ann Keller is an endowed Distinguished Professor in Biocomplexity, Director of the Social and Decision Analytics Division within the Biocomplexity Institute and Initiative at University of Virginia and Professor of Public Health Sciences. Her areas of expertise are social and decision informatics, statistical underpinnings of data science, and data access and confidentiality. Dr. Keller is a leading voice in creating the science of all data and advancing this research across disciplines to benefit society. Dr. Keller is an Elected Member of the National Academy of Engineering. She has served as a member of the National Academy of Sciences Board on Mathematical Sciences and Their Applications, the Committee on National Statistics, and has chaired the Committee on Applied and Theoretical Statistics. She is fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, elected member of the International Statistics Institute, fellow and past president of the American Statistical Association, and member of the JASON advisory group

Clarissa Noble Rural Health Manager VA State Office of Rural Health

Ms. Clarissa Noble has been with the Virginia State Office of Rural Health since May 2018, and serves as the Rural Health Manager within the Virginia Department of Health (VDH), Office of Health Equity (OHE). CEO & President

Stephen Moret is President and CEO of the Virginia Economic Development Partnership. At VEDP, he has collaborated with state, regional, and local partners to craft an ambitious vision focused on transformational goals, including accelerating employment growth; enabling every region to grow; and moving Virginia back to the top of national business climate rankings.

At VEDP, he led Virginia's successful state-and-local team bid for Amazon's HQ2; designed Virginia's \$1.1-billion Tech Talent Investment Program; and has launched a world-class, custom workforce initiative, the Virginia Talent Accelerator Program. Previously he served as Louisiana Secretary of Economic Development, CEO of the LSU Foundation, and as a consultant with McKinsey & Company.

Moret earned an MBA from Harvard Business School as well as a doctorate in higher education management from the University of Pennsylvania, where his research focused on linkages between higher education and the labor market.
